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

- Technology: Polycom Internet Protocol (IP)





Impact of Conferences


coordination of the research collaboration

- Introduced new contacts for the researchers and students.
- Facilitated other kinds of exchanges that extended beyond the conferences.
- Generated considerable enthusiasm among students: Dissertation Foreign study for Mexican students
- Spawned new cross-cultural cross-national comparative study comparing home literacy in U.S. Latino families and Yucatecan Mayan families.

Mexican Researcher

What (do) you think about (it) Luis.. because probably you have the same situation with the Hispanic people in Arizona?



U.S. Researcher

.... It is similar in that the sense that the dominant language ideologies push English at the expense of Spanish. Now What strikes me about the data is that Maya the language does not seem to be at risk of loss.



Mexican Researcher (translating for a Mexican student)

....probably in one generation (there) could be possible loss of language because children are not encouraged to speak the Mayan language.



U.S. Researcher

It strikes me that the usual pathway that we propose in the literature of development of reading and writing in the first language may not be possible under the circumstances that you describe.....

Videoconference-Mediated International Collaborations

- Great potential but not a substitute for international exchanges.
- Costly Technical and Social infrastructure
- Technical Barriers remain (Skype iChat AV, etc. may be less costly alternatives for point-to-point)
- Need for greater commitment of researchers in both developed and developing countries to prioritize international collaboration.

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
