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This course is designed to provide you with an intense experience that combines the theories and information you've been acquiring in your classes with "real-life" practice in a community setting. The Urban Discovery Academy is a new Charter Elementary School (K-8) directly across the street from Balboa Park in San Diego. At Urban Discovery you will have the chance to work after school two afternoons per week, helping inner-city kids with their homework and one-on-one enrichment activities. These can be arranged around your own personal interests and skills, like digital media projects, visual or performing arts, science explorations, sports activities and more. Readings will be assigned that are directly related to your experiences in the program and will be discussed weekly at the site. You will also be investigating a research question of your making, one that is directly related to your major, writing weekly field notes, and writing a final paper at the end of the quarter.

The course has been designed to help your develop qualitative research skills (participant observation, field note taking, and data analysis techniques) and use field experience as the foundation for evaluating theories you are acquiring in your courses. As a result of participation in this class, you are expected to improve your writing skills for creating research reports, data analysis, and expository and narrative texts, and to enhance your interpersonal skills for communicating with adults and children in informal settings.
